# Part B: Review of outcomes in the previous academic year

## Pupil premium strategy outcomes

This details the impact that our pupil premium activity had on pupils in the 2022 to 2023 academic year.

Ensure that PP attendance is at least 95% or above (in line with whole school)

Disadvantaged attendance for 2022-2023 was 94.7% so slightly below the whole school figure of 95.3%.

Ensure that Reading and Writing attainment is at least at national levels for PP pupils at KS1 and KS2.

100% of disadvantaged pupils made at least 6 steps' progress in Reading and in Writing in 2022-2023 (based on Target Tracker data)

#### Attainment for PP pupils was:

Reading – 75% at or above age-related expectation and 50% above;

Writing – 50% at or above age-related expectation and 50% above.

Ensure that Maths attainment is at least at national levels for PP pupils at KS1 and KS2.

75% of disadvantaged pupils made at least 6 steps' progress in Maths in 2022-2023 and 100% made at least 5 steps. (based on Target Tracker data)

#### Attainment for PP pupils was:

Maths – 75% at or above age-related expectation and 75% above.

Ensure that the Unity 'PP Offer' is in place

Pupils were able to access PP funding for uniform, wraparound care and music tuition. Pupils were also able to access funding for residential and external visits. Bursaries for Rock Steady Music were also available for PP pupils (one per term).

Age-related expectation figures show that the majority of tutored pupils made at least age-related expectations for Reading and Maths.

Progress was strong for pupils with 100% making 6 steps with several making 7 steps. The focus for the tutoring was Year 6 pupils as they had had considerable disruption to their Key Stage 2 learning throughout lockdown. It is also worth noting that 2 pupils were 1 mark away each from Expected Standard which would have improved the results even further.
